SAMPLE RESUME LANGUAGE FOR COUNSELORS WORK EXPERIENCE

Working as a camp counselor, I received valuable professional development in the form pre-camp staff training, as well the opportunity to hone my skills in:

Leadership - modeled character and good behavior for campers including teamwork, listening, responsibility, initiative, and sportsmanship; motivated campers to develop new skills; supported campers in their efforts to try new activities and resolve conflicts.

Management and Supervision - accepted 24-hour responsibility for managing daily activities of a diverse group of campers over the course of three weeks.

Problem Solving and Conflict Resolution - practiced listening and counseling skills by helping campers learn to live together; developed solutions for camper conflicts; taught campers how to work together to resolve problems themselves.

Teamwork - cooperated with other counselors within the camp to lead group activities modeled collaboration to campers as a skill for group achievement.

Program Development - assisted camp leaders with program activities, education and creative activities, and event planning.

Evaluation - regularly observed campers' behavior and provided feedback to children as necessary; reported concerns to camp directors as needed.
